Pregancy Center supports families

t has often been said that when God closes a door, He opens a window. For Patricia Penner, she followed where God was leading her after leaving the oil and gas industry and that path led her straight to helping young women and men deal with their pregnancies when others might be turning their backs on them.

Penner – the Sealy Pregnancy Resource Center Executive Director – said she had volunteered for 10 years at Houston Pregnancy Help Center in both the Fifth Ward and Down-

"I moved to Sealy that same year I retired from BP during the down-turn of the oil and gas industry. My husband encouraged me to see where God wanted me instead of returning to oil and gas. I started working on developing the structure of the center in 2014. LifeBridge Community Church offered us a home for the center," Penner said. "The congregation voted to build out the game room for the center. We opened our door in February 2016."

Penner said her role as the executive director could be described in one word – busy.

"I have never seen God work in so many amazing, wonderful ways as I have seen here. Organizations, churches and people in the community come together in supporting these young ladies and young men. It's a lot to juggle, but what I have learned is that everyone has their role and journey. The key is to utilize their varied talents in this ministry," Penner said.

The Sealy Pregnancy Resource Center – located at 2555 FM 1094 – is in continual need of wipes, diapers and toiletry items such as baby shampoo, baby wash, formula and baby food.

"I am in the process of developing a diaper bank. The Sealy community does not qualify to utilize the one in Houston. Therefore, I am looking at starting one here. We have run out of space in our current facility and are in the process of building a larger facility to see more young ladies in a given time period. We
