What Did You Do While Staying Home In 2020? Knitting a Weather Scarf kept Shirley Locke busy, while also bringing awareness to climate change.

In January 2020 when Shirley decided to knit a Weather Scarf, she didn't know that her concerns for keeping up with it would be assuaged by all the extra time she had at home beginning in March due COVID-19. Weather or Temperature Scarves are actually quite common and often used as teaching aids in classrooms. Shirley learned about them from an NYT article and purchased her yarn and a pattern from "The Yarnery," a small business that has been a Saint Paul, Minnesota fiber arts institution for over 45 years. Every day she knit two rows matching the color to the daily high temperature listed by AccuWeather for our 77385 zip code. The texture of the scarf varied based on whether the actual high temperature was higher, lower, or the same as the historical average. This was accomplished by the type of stitch used in that day's row. Not surprisingly, Shirley used the stitch that indicated "higher than historical average" more often over the course of the year.

The year 2020 was unpredictable in many ways - from the emergence of the global pandemic to protests and social unrest, from wildfires to floods. Shirley found that working on her Weather Scarf was an oddly comforting way to channel her anxieties and feel a sense of control over each day. It also allowed her to gain more insight into how climate change was having a marked effect on our temperature, plants, watering needs, and wildlife decline. During the many 95-degree and above days of "Firebrush Red," Shirley looked forward to the days of "Admiral" and "Rainier" blues when being outdoors would require a light jacket. Regrettably, Shirley did not start a 2021 scarf, but had she done so, a special stitch and color would have been in order during our snowmageddon this February!

It's not too late to start one if anyone is interested. Shirley would be glad to share her pattern and advice.

BALLS

• 1 cup almond flour EDIENTS: • ½ cup raw sunflower seeds

- 1 lemon zest
- 2 tbsp lemon juice
- 2 tbsp coconut oil (melted)
- 1-2 tbsp sugar-free "maple syrup" (e.g. Lakanto)
- 1 cup unsweetened Coconut Flakes
- $\frac{1}{2}$ tsp lemon extract

1. GRIND. Grind the sunflower seeds and coconut flakes for a few seconds, until they have a flour-like texture.

- 2.MIX. In a bowl mix together the almond flour, sunflower seeds, coconut flakes and lemon zest. In a separate bowl mix the lemon juice, melted coconut oil and sugar-free maple syrup.
- 3. COMBINE. Add the dry ingredients into the bowl of the wet ingredients. Stir all ingredients together until thoroughly combined.
- 4.ROLL INTO BALLS. Using wet hands, roll tablespoons of mixture into balls (approximately 14 balls).
- 5.CHILL. Place balls into the refrigerator for a minimum of 20 minutes to set before serving.

The balls will last up 1 week in the refrigerator (sealed container) or up to 1 month in the freezer.

PROPERTY TAXES (By Kelli McNee

Every year in the fall while the kids are looking forward to dressing up for Halloween, the adults are dreading the arrival of the annual Montgomery County Appraisal District Notice of Value forms. This year is no different than previous years except for one little thing...Almost everyone's home value increased. If you are one of the fortunate few whose value stayed the same or decreased, then breathe a sigh of relief and know you got off easy this year.

Home values are based on the previous year's sales in your precise neighborhood CODE, not your subdivision or city, but your neighborhood code. MCAD assigns codes to a set of homes. Usually, these homes are all within a block or two. For instance, in West Village Floating Heart Court and Parts of Harper's Way share a neighborhood code with Threadtail and Spreadwing (code 14492.0). If you are familiar with the streets, then you know the values of these homes vary. When updating the value each year, the appraisal district can only compare homes within the same neighborhood code. This being said, that does not mean that is exactly what they do.

Why You Should Protest

In Texas, if this is your primary home you are living in, then you have something called a Homestead Exemption. Not only does this exemption lower your property tax rate, but it also protects you from the amount of value increase that can happen in one year. The appraised value of a homestead home is limited to a 10% increase max per year. If you think of this as a growing number then you will understand the need to keep this value as low as possible, as the 10% max increase next year is based on this year's final result. The appraisal district is not perfect and often uses information that is not correct to value your home. That wrong information could be the wrong neighborhood code, wrong square footage, or any number of things that may not actually pertain to your home. The appraisal district counts on you to assume they are correct and therefore, do nothing about protesting the value of your home.

In addition to comparing your home to the other homes in your code that have sold, there are other factors that can affect the value of your home that the district may not know about. Did you have a renter that had caused damage prior to moving back into it? Did you have damage during the "Snowpocalypse" and

need a temporary disaster exemption? Or maybe you had a grocery store built behind your house. There are various reasons that your home may not be worth as much as a neighbor's home, but the appraisal district just does not know about it. Doing nothing about the rising value of your home tells the appraisal district you agree with their value and sets this new value for the starting point next year.

Not only does protesting your value save you money but by protesting you are asking the appraisal district to provide you the proof and valuation method of how they came to the value they did. This is called the House Bill 201 evidence packet or HB 201 for short. They only provide this upon request after a property tax protest has been filed.

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perfect, and sometimes they do not catch this sale, or maybe it was a For Sale by Owner and not disclosed to the district. Either way, the value is set to whatever that notice of appraised value has you at.
