

TALKING TRASH

Our regular collection day is **Tuesday** rash can be placed on the curb for pickup no earlier than 6 pm on Monday evening. This includes our rolling bins as well as bags of lawn clippings. When you place your bins, be sure they are curbside (not in the street) and placed at least 3 ft. apart. *Generally speaking* after a Monday holiday, trash and recycling will be picked up on Wednesday.

Lawn clippings must be bagged in the approved clear, biodegradable bags with the city-approved logo. If you pay a lawn service to bag your clippings, they are responsible for removing them from your property. Please do not leave lawn clipping bags or bundles on the curb beyond the Monday evening thru pick up time frame. If you are self-bagging your clippings, please do not place on the curbside until the stated pick up time frame.

Heavy trash collection is the 3rd Thursday of each month. Tree waste is collected in the odd numbered months and junk waste is collected in the even numbered months.

If you have damaged containers or are in need of the registered containers, call the City of Houston at 3-1-1.

A Short History of Shepherd Park Plaza by Dorothy Lofton

Long before the white man came, Orcoquisac Indians hunted deer, bear and buffalo in this area. They were a small tribe, which roamed the lower San Jacinto and Trinity River valleys, fish ing and hunting in family groups along the upper reaches of Galveston Bay.

Evidence of several of their camps has been uncovered along Spring and Cypress creeks. In winter they settled into semi-permanent villages in the northern part of Harris County where they hunted and sometimes cultivated maize.

Farming has long been a part of life in this area. (Even today we have a Community Garden, managed by SPP's own Beth Galiano, at the entrance to our subdivision on Alba.) Glenn Holliday, first president of our Civic Club, recalled growing up in the early 1920s on a truck farm on what is now Donovan Street.

The area where we live (here in Shepherd Park Plaza) was once the location of vegetable and dairy farms; the Farmers Market on Airline was created to provide a place for these small truck farmers to sell their produce. The subdivision as we know it today began with the sale of 222 lots on 10 blocks in what is now called Section One.

This sale was made to Suburban Homes Lumber / Oak Glen building Company on May 29, 1958 by Sweeney Estates, owned by John S. Mellinger, an attorney with offices in the old Union National Bank Building. In October 1958 the neighborhood newspaper, *The Leader*, reported that Ella Boulevard had been re-topped from W. 43rd to Pinemont. And, in September 1959 *The Leader* reported that "extensive... residential development was taking place right at our doorstep." Five model homes were built on Chamboard in Section One, just east of Alba.

Shepherd Park Plaza today encompasses four sections and 729 homes and is considered one of the best neighborhoods in the city - and one of the safest. In 1993 Shepherd Park Plaza's "Citizens on Patrol" under the leadership of Don Blaise was cited by the Houston Police Department for significantly reducing neighborhood crime.

Shepherd Park Plaza Patrol (SPPCP) was formed in August, 1991 and is made up of neighbors like yourself who have volunteered to patrol the neighborhood at scheduled times. Since the patrol started, crime has dropped by approximately 75%. One hour a week is the normally s patrol time. There are quarterly meetings to meet other volunteers, learn about the program, etc. The Patrol is completely financed by donations from Shepherd Park Plaza residents. As a Patroller, you are furnished with signs for your car so you are easily recognizable to the public.

Vacation Watch is available for weekends, vacations, etc. through our Constable Program. Patrollers are greatly needed, and we would appreciate your participation. Patrollers meet their neighbors, earn gas card credits for hours patrolled, and provide a valuable service to the new address you call home. SPP Constable Program

SPPCC's 2023 Deputy Constable Patrol Fundraising Campaign is underway and if you've not yet contributed, it's not too late. The suggested donation is \$325 or just 90 cents a day—a lot less than a cup of Starbuck's coffee.

What do you get for \$325?

Two uniformed deputies patrolling our neighborhood in a marked vehicle 80 hours per week. With these two shifts, we now have night and day coverage! Additionally, officers from the Constable's patrol division make numerous sweeps of SPP when our deputy is not on duty. There are not more dedicated officers on the force. They consider SPP their own neighborhood and are resolved to keep SPP a safe place to live. Their work hours are set by the SPP Board and are based on crime statistics for our neighborhood and the patrol hours of our Citizens Patrol. A great part of the time, our deputy is patrolling while we are all fast asleep.

Why do we need a Deputy Constable Patrol?

Just open the newspaper and read about the crime in our city! The Houston Police Department is stretched to the limit and we have had instances in SPP where the police never responded to a call. Having an officer only a minute away is a great comfort and an even better deterrent to criminals.

Won't you send in your contribution today?

The quicker we receive your donation, the better able we are to budget for the coming year. It also saves us the cost of mailing a second notice. If you can't afford the \$325 fee, please send what you can. Sadly, only 61% of SPP residents contribute to the program. The other 39% receive the benefits but contribute nothing to the program. If this trend continues, we will not have a program. If we had 100% participation, we could add an extra deputy to the program. Let's all get on board and support this important security program for our neighborhood.
